

Welcome to Altrincham Kersal

A very warm welcome to players, officials and spectators of Altrincham Kersal.

Altrincham Kersal was born on a cold and wet March evening in 1897 in the Deansgate Hotel in Manchester. That was just 24 years after the founding of the RFU. The meeting in the Deansgate hotel also decided that the annual subscription should be ten shillings and sixpence and that they would seek the use of land in Myrtle Grove, Prestwich as their playing field. It was agreed that they call the club - The Kersal Rugby Football Club.

After playing at various grounds around Manchester, the club finally settled at Stelfox Avenue in 1968 and in the years since has enjoyed some spectacular success, especially in Cup compeitions. It has also produced some excellent players, notably Mark (that was a try) Cueto and our own coach, Andy Roberts was a stalwart for some time.

But what of the present? We have won all of our last four contests against Kersal, some easier than others., racking up winning scores of 38-15, 49-25, 41-27 and, earlier this year, 20-19, in a game of Lazarene proportions, where we came back from the dead to sneak the win in the last seconds of the game. However, don't be fooled by all this. In the current season they may lie five places below us in the league table but their playing record includes wins over Firswood Waterloo and St Benedicts and a draw with Stockport. They have lost to Vale of Lune, Wilmslow and, strangely, Rochdale, so they have performed well above their lowly league position. So beware, this could be the game where they reverse the trend. Let battle begin.

The Road To The Final - Missed

Warrington seemed well set to play their first cup final for some time when they easily despatched Eccles n the semi final of the Lancashire Trophy back in August and then drew Broughton Park in the semis. On the face of it, this looked like the easier of the two semi finals, as Broughton Park are now in South Lancs/Cheshire 1 while the other two semifinalist were fellow North 1 West sides, Manchester and Burnage,

However, it was not to be, as Park proved a very tough nut to crack and eventually won the tie 35-22. Burnage beat Manchester, so if we had beaten Park we would have had a reply of the match we won earlier in the season.

It was not to be and now we must look towards performing consistently in the league.

Warrington 22 Broughton Park 35 - 14 October 2017

Warrington's dream of playing in a cup final came to an end at the final hurdle, when they were beaten by a talented Broughton Park in the semi-final of the Lancashire Trophy at Walton Lea Road. In a match which kept spectators on their toes right up to the final minute, ark eventually ran out worthy winners and will now meet Burnage.

Having lost the previous week by a penalty try in extra time, it was ironic that Warrington should open their account through such a try. It was awarded after ten minutes, during Warrington's first excursion into Park territory, when the visitors were penalized under their posts to give Warrington a 7 point lead.

It didn't take Park long to reply when they counter attacked from their own 22 and their powerful right winger did well to touch down in the corner, and although the touch judge had signaled that he had put a foot in touch, the try was awarded.

Without the electric pace of Tom Arnold, Max Caldwell and Nathan Beesley and the aggression of Sean Callendar, Warrington looked almost pedestrian during the first half. Park took full advantage of this, first when they went ahead with a push over try from a set scrum and then, after Warrington had kicked a penalty to level the cores, when they scored two converted tries within two minutes on the stroke of half time. First they too were awarded a penalty try following a Warrington high tackle and then, when they regained possession from the kick off, they stormed over to make the half time score 22-10.

It was Warrington's turn to storm early in the second period, when a kick ahead and follow-up catch from Keiron Hughes took play deep into Park territory. An efficient ruck was followed by a long pass from Tom Wood to Chris White and the mobile prop made ground before passing to Keiron Hughes, who finished off.

Warrington then found themselves again on the back foot until a Thompson strike against the head relieved the pressure. The home side quickly returned to the attack and good hands across the field allowed winger Jack Morgan to squeeze in in the corner. Ben Hockenhull converted magnificently from the touchline and the sides were level.

Just when spectators were discussing what should happen in the event of a draw, Park put an end to all speculation by scoring twice, first in the corner and then close to the posts, after Warrington's defence had eventually submitted to a series of relentless drives on their line. A Park penalty completed the scoring one minute before the end but the game was already beyond Warrington's reach by then.

"We were totally out of sorts today," confessed coach Andy Roberts. "But even so, Park played very well and deserved to win. We wish them the best of luck in the final."

Eccles 10 Warrington 60 - 26th August 2017

After a mixed start, Warrington eventually totally destroyed Eccles with an eight try performance to march confidently into the semi-finals of the Lancashire Trophy.

Warrington struck first within three minutes of the kick-off. After withstanding continuous Warrington pressure, Eccles tried to relieve the onslaught with a clearing kick. Unfortunately for them, the ball was fielded by Jamie Thompson just outside his own 22 and the talented full back beat three of the onrushing defence before handing onto Kieran Hughes. The little speedster showed he has lost none of his pace after a year's enforced lay-off and beat the cover to touch down under the posts. Darren Thomas converted.

The teams then exchanged penalties before the Thompson/Hughes combination sprang into action again and the centre picked up his second try, converted by Darren Norman.

The young Eccles side then came back into contention when a beautiful kick ahead and some slick passing saw them score an excellent try which was converted to cut Warrington's lead to just five points. However, this was to be the last time that they troubled the scoreboard. Shortly before half time, iconic hooker Paul Thompson took a defence-splitting line after receiving a short pass from Jamie Thompson and sprinted 30 yards to touch down. Darren Norman again added the extras.

The second half saw Warrington quickly strengthen their position with a penalty from Danny Griffiths who had taken over the kicking duties. They then fully unleashed their unstoppable attacking force by scoring five tries without reply. First, an exquisite floating pass from Tom Wood found Max Caldwell and the young winger combined pace and a sidestep to score and allow an easy conversion. The forwards then won a driving scrum 25 yards out and Jamie Thompson delivered a moment of magic as he dummied and stepped his way over for another converted try. Danny Griffiths then demonstrated his power and pace before off-loading to Max Caldwell and the winger sped over for his second score.

Kieran Hughes then claimed his hat trick by picking up and scoring after a confused period of play in the Eccles red zone and the forwards finally got in on the act when they demolished the Eccles pack at a five yard scrum and a slimmed-down Zak Lythgoe claimed the score.

"An excellent result," was the verdict of coach Andy Roberts, after playing a rare 80 minutes at scrum half. "However, when I add the performances in this game to those in our two pre-season trials, I can see that we may have selection problems, as there is real competition for every position. Mind you, those are good problems to have."

Mind you, those comments were made before our third team and, then, second team problems started. It can only get better!!!
